### I. Executive Summary

It has been pleasure for AMIDEAST/Egypt to deliver 48 hours of English language instructions to 35 students from under privileged schools in the Moqatam district, as sponsored by Mohamed Shafik Gabr Foundation for Social Development. This activity took place during the spring semester as was envisioned. AMIDEAST deeply appreciates the opportunity given by the Foundation to serve the local community.

Classes started on Saturday February 13, 2010 and ended on Sunday, April 11, 2010.

As planned for the first year of the program, the spring semester was dedicated to enhancing students' language skills through a variety of classroom activities. In addition, a written assessment was incorporated into the program's academic schedule. Students were given 6 quizzes and 1 final test in order to measure their progress.

The impact on students' performance at school was measured using an updated end-of-semester evaluation form. The evaluation form solicited feedback from both parents and teachers on the immediate change in the performance of the students through a range of questions pertaining to students' general behavior and academic performance. The captured feedback demonstrated improvement not only in the students' academic performance, but also in their communication and interpersonal skills. AMIDEAST's Special

Projects Team analyzed the data received from this assessment and has included the captured feedback as an annex to this report. (Please reference the Report Annex).

## II. Program Schedule

The training program took place at the Mohamed Shafik Gabr Foundation for Social Development premises in Moqatam Heights. As planned, 'Taghyeer' students received 48 instructional hours of English language. Three classes with 35 students met three times a week for two hours per class. The same three teachers who executed the summer semester continued teaching the students during the spring semester.

As planned prior to the semester start date, classes were not held on the following dates:

- Thursday 25<sup>th</sup> February, 2010 for the observance of the Al-Mawled Al-Nabawy holiday.
- Sunday 4<sup>th</sup> April, 2010 for the observance of the Coptic Easter holiday.
- Monday 5<sup>th</sup> April, 2010 for observance of the Sham El- Neseem holiday.

In order to accommodate for the observance of these holidays the program end dates were altered slightly. Therefore, in spite of the holiday schedule, each class completed its planned 48 instructional hours.

## III. Program Content

#### 1- Books:

In order to achieve the objectives of the training program, AMIDEAST used an age-appropriate textbook titled *Connect 1*. This series is a fun, multi-skill course written and designed specifically for adolescents who are studying English for the first time. It develops speaking, listening, reading and writing skills while simultaneously connecting students with one another, their community and the world outside the classroom.

As a continuation of the fall semester, three units (Units 6, 7 and 8) of *Connect 1* were covered during the spring semester. Students also practiced language in the classroom through a variety of activities. Additionally, they were given homework assignments in order to reinforce what they learned.

#### 3- Students' Assessment and Evaluation:

In order to measure the language progress of the students, AMIDEAST devised an academic assessment plan that reflected the students' acquisition of English language as well as personal attitude development. Each student was assessed individually through scored written quizzes and teacher class observations.

The assessments included the following content:

The updated Arabic Program Evaluation form helped AMIDEAST measure the program's impact on the students' behavior and academic performance. ## V. <u>Upcoming semester - Second Year</u>

#### **Summer Semester 2010**

AMIDEAST has provided 163 instructional hours as per the letter of agreement with The Mohamed Shafik Gabr Foundation for Social Development.

The summer semester will be the first semester of the program's second year and will cover 72 hours of instruction.

The summer semester is scheduled to start on June 19, 2010 and will conclude on August 5, 2010. Each group of students will meet three times per week (Sat – Mon – Wed/Sun – Tue – Thu).

Each class will meet for four hours with one session of three hours during the week of August 1-5, 2010.

The summer schedule will therefore be as follows: 6 weeks \* 3 days \* 4 hours = 72 hours
1 week \* I day \* 3 hours = 3 hours
Total number of instructional hours: 75

This schedule allows the students a chance to enjoy their summer vacation. Three field trips will be arranged during the summer semester as planned and agreed upon with the foundation.

### VI. Conclusion

The students have shown considerable progress during the spring semester. They have become very familiar with the communicative approach applied in the classroom, and their English language proficiency has developed remarkably.

Spring 2010 semester was the last semester in the first year of "*Taghyeer Program*". During which, the students have completed 163 instructional hours of English language training.

The communicative approach and active learning approaches applied in the program have positively changed the students' learning styles. They have become more independent and analytical regarding learning the language. Introducing the language in a communicative, friendly and interesting way has supported the students internalizing the language. Eventually, this has led to the students' natural production of the language.

A remarkable change in personal attitudes is noticed by parents and school teachers as a result of addressing team work and respecting the other values in the students.

As evaluated by parents and school teachers, the first year of the program has been a success that will be taken as a lesson learned for the program's second year.
